

## Physical Description:

One story brick over wood frame Classical-style Presbyterian church. 3 x 7 bay. Gable roof over T-shape plan. Pedimented closed gables. Corniced belt course. Light-colored brick is regularly coursed. Exterior brick chimney on east facade. High concrete foundation with basement. Foundation is plinthed.

BAVELEIL COUNTY DEBIARY

Open entry is central to facade and is reached by a wide flight of concrete steps. Entry is closed and pedimented with classical-style entabulature with extensive terra cotta trim. The entry roof is supported by four doric-style brick columns with terra cotta capitals and bases. Double wooden doors have famlight and glass block sidelights. Entry at northside of church has original lighted wood doors.

Majority of windows on walls are stained glass. Windows are stylobated. Windows in basement are 1/1 double-hung sash.

Metal fire escape and exit door on south wall.

Site is level with street.

## Historical Information

The 1920 Samborn map shows this church as a one story edifice with steam heat and electric lights. By 1939, there had been no major exterior renovations.

Realizing the need for a new church, a committee was formed in 1916 by the Presbyterian congregation of Havre. The original Presbyterian church was sold to the baptists and moved a block north (See 625 Fourth Avenue). The cornerstone was laid for this church in May, 1917. Because of World War I and the following lean years, however, the new Presbyterian church was not completed until 1922. Because of an outstanding debt owed on the building, the new church was not officially dedicated until 1942.

In 1954, the church was issued a building permit to remodel the present structure for \$20,000. Since the outside appearance of the church has changed very little since 1922, the bulk of the money must have been spent on interior renovations.

It would qualify for the National Register under criteria C as a good local example of a church built in Havre during the period of its greatest demographic and economic growth from 1913 to 1917.
